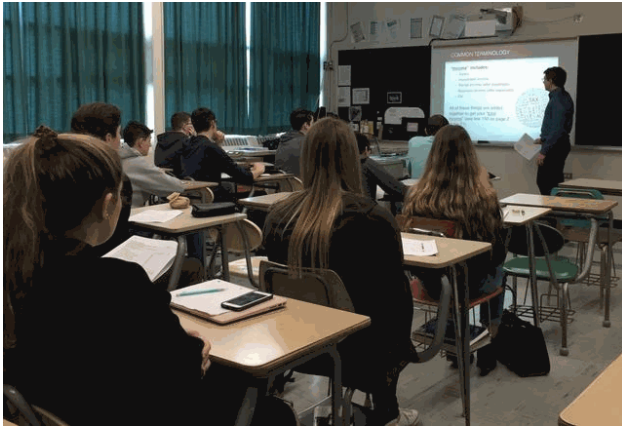
Summer Co-op Meeting in Mid-April

What's Happening in Classes This Week?

Grade 12 Accounting

This week in Grade 12 Accounting, guest speaker Brent Bartolucci, Senior Accountant at Collins Barrow and Lockerby alumnus (2010), gave a timely lesson on preparing a personal tax return. Brent's presentation was a clear and easy to follow example of a typical income tax return for a working teenager. Students came away with a template and valuable skills they could apply outside of the classroom right now.

Grade 12 Med Tech by Ashley and Kaarina



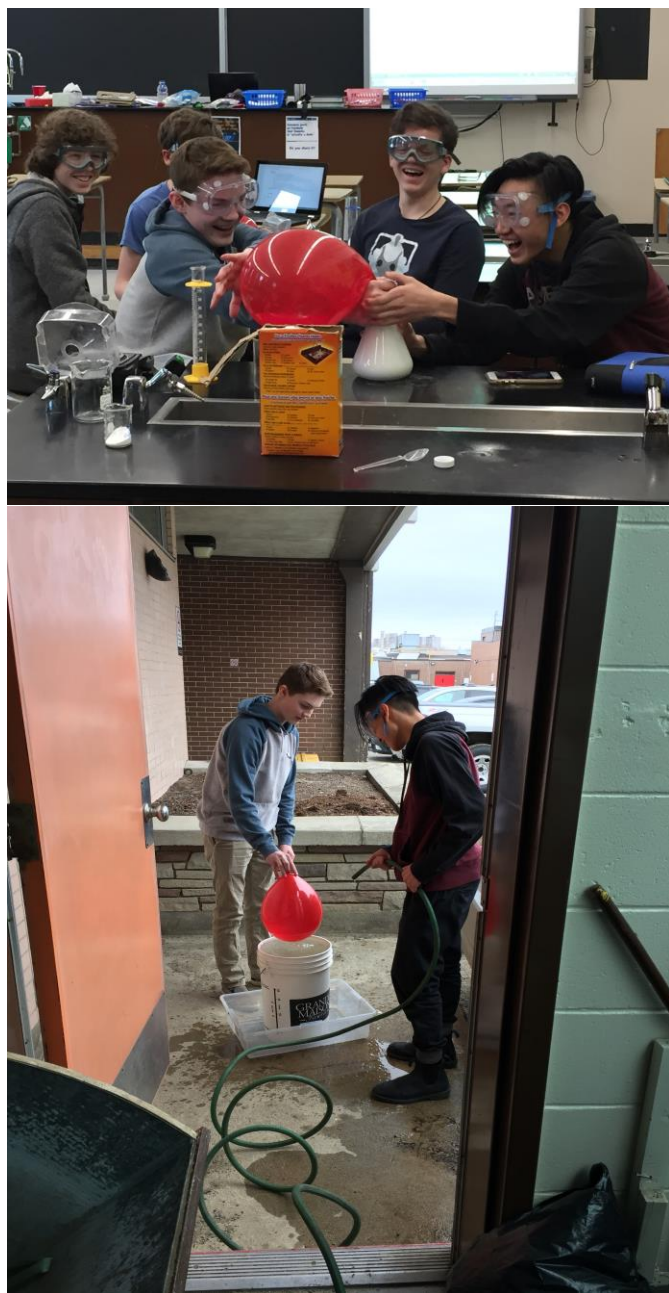
In Grade 12 Med Tech, we are learning how to interview and interact with patients as well as to diagnose their conditions by looking at their symptoms and patient history. For our current assignment, we are creating videos of us taking on the roles of a doctor and their patient. We used information we received about their symptoms and history to diagnose their condition. This was a very hands-on and fun experience to learn more about what it would feel like to be in a real-life situation of being a doctor. We highly recommend taking this class if you are interested in anything related to health care.

Grade 9 Math

Grade 9 Math students in Mr. Hatzis' class are playing an "unfair" board game with dice. After several rounds, the students determine mathematically how to make the game "fair".



Grade 9 Science



This week in Mrs. Donato's Grade 9 Science class, students have been learning about density. They were given the question "What is the density of carbon dioxide gas?", and had to design an investigation that would answer the question. Students had to generate carbon dioxide using a chemical reaction, collect it, and measure mass and volume of the gas as accurately as possible. One group designed their chemical reaction to make a large volume of carbon dioxide gas, and they had to be creative when measuring volume. This was a great inquiry-based way to learn about density and volume calculations, and experimental error.

Grade 10 History

Grade 10 history students learned a variety of aspects of World War I, including war on the home front. They discussed rationing and to celebrate the end of the war, could either take their favourite recipe and re-write it applying rationing guidelines, or cook a recipe that followed rationing guidelines. Bella and Nyah baked apple crisp which had apples and oats as main ingredients, while Lexi and Brandy baked muffins that used shortening instead of butter along with other modifications.
