LCS STUDENTS SHINE AT SUDBURY'S SCIENCE OLYMPICS!

The annual Sudbury Science Olympics were held at Science North on Thursday. From a field of 45 junior and senior teams from high schools across the city, three Lockerby teams distinguished themselves with podium finishes. The grade 10 team of Nethra W., Bryan W., Becca B., and Ian W. took home the bronze medal in the junior category, while the grade 11/12 team of Damien S., Faith D., Kailyn C., and Abby D. walked away with the silver medal in the senior category. Lockerby was also bestowed with the coveted Spirit Award, lead by the grade 11/12 team of Emma K., Rayak S., Margaret I., and Arvin K. The grade 9 team of Ava B., Conner M., Ella C., and Darren T. were participating in this competition for the first time at this event and performed extremely well in the face of some very stiff competition.



AP CAPSTONE PROGRAM AT LOCKERBY

Last week, AP Capstone students from Ms. Levan's Seminar and Ms. Kovala's Research classes enjoyed a presentation about research from Laurentian University students Brandon McIsaac (B.Sc. and B.Sc.N) and Adam Kirkwood (B.Sc. and M.Sc.). Brandon discussed his research in neurocognitive disorders and Adam discussed his research about permafrost. Both shared their experiences arriving at their research questions, developing their research methods, gathering data, working with mentors, and overcoming frustrations and setbacks. AP students found the presentation entertaining, informative, and reassuring as they work through their own research projects.



HEALTH AND WELLNESS GUEST SPEAKER

On Wednesday, grade twelve students in Ms. Hunda's health care class were very pleased to welcome Mr. Jeff Shrigley from the Loughheed Funeral Homes. Jeff, who is a former graduate of Lockerby Composite School, kindly explained what it is like to work as a funeral director and mentioned the steps it took in order for him to get there. He engaged students in learning about the key fundamental roles and practices of his occupation and he also encouraged students to pursue their career of choice in the medical field, or in any field of interest.



WHAT'S NEW IN STEP SCIENCE?

Students in Mrs. Donato's grade 9 science class discovered that ionic solutions can conduct electricity. Students were provided with a cart full of seemingly random materials, and figured out how to use these items to build conductivity testers. They designed and built their own testers, and used them to compare the conductivity of distilled water to that of salt water.



WHAT'S NEW IN HEALTH CARE TECHNOLOGY?

Students in the grade 11 Health Care Technology class are creating health awareness videos, and have been using professional video equipment that is available for all students to use. These include lighting and green screens, as well as health care equipment such as stretchers and health care simulation mannequins.



STUDYING ARCHITECTURE . . .

Students studying architecture have been learning about house styles and how modern houses often incorporate historical architectural elements from heritage homes. Styles discussed in class include Georgian, Victorian, Post Modern, Tudor, Chateau, Ranch, Cape Cod, Victory among others. Students were asked to work from a standard footprint but as you can see, many different looks can be achieved from one size. Can you spot the Victorian-style house? (Hint: it's the one with the finial).

Curling

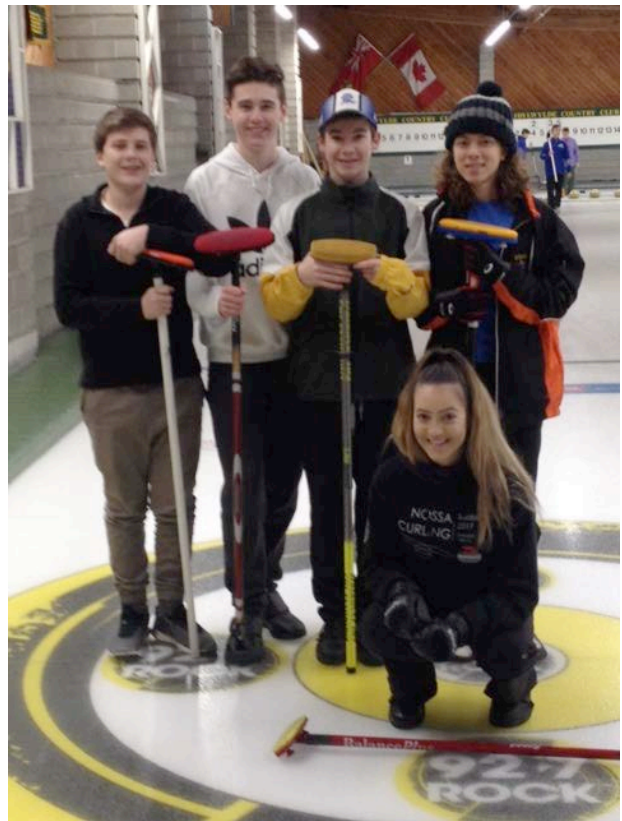
