


SMALL ENGINES AT LOCKERBY COMPOSITE


WHAT'S NEW THE LIBRARY?


I'll See You in Paris The author winds together the lives of three women born generations apart, but who face similar struggles of love and heartbreak.





The ISIS Apocalypse



Dear Parents/Guardians:

RE: Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) 2019 and Condensed Schedule for Wednesday, March 27, 2019

A tradition of excellence. A future of promise.

The OSSLT is a graduation requirement administered by the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO). The test assesses the reading and writing skills that students are expected to have learned in all subjects by the end of Grade 9, as outlined in *The Ontario Curriculum*.

In order to accommodate the test on Wednesday, March 27, 2019, Lockerby will have a short period day. The school will be open in the morning, and regular scheduled classes will run in the afternoon. After lunch all students will attend Periods 1, 2, 3 and 4. If students arrive in the morning and are not writing the test, they can use this time to work on projects and receive extra help in assigned areas.

All eligible students will be writing the OSSLT in the morning. Students are to arrive at school at the regular time and report to their assigned testing room. Below is the schedule for the day:

Students who successfully pass the March OSSLT will obtain their graduation requirement and will <u>not</u> be required to write the test again. Students who are unsuccessful will have the options of taking a course in Summer School or signing up for the Ontario Literacy Course being offered at Lockerby Composite School during the 2019-2020 school year.

Please mark March 27 in your calendar to ensure that your child is present at school for the OSSLT. You can help your child prepare for the test by accessing an online practice version at <u>www.eqao.com/en/assessments/eqao-online</u>. They can also use this interactive gsuite site as well for extra test prep http://gsuitehelp.ca/osslt/.

College and University Applications

Post-Secondary applications marks have been sent to Ontario colleges and universities. Students are asked to check their OCAS and OUAC accounts to ensure that all of their courses and marks have been transferred. Students should also be checking their individual post-secondary portals (i.e., Cambrian College and/or Laurentian University). Many of the schools have been providing details regarding additional requirements, incomplete applications, etc. Students must ensure that all of the necessary details for their application are complete as they risk not being accepted into their program of choice if they fail to complete this very important step.

Cambrian College

Students who have received an offer to Cambrian College should have received a burgundy booklet titled, 'This is the Serious Stuff.' The booklet outlines necessary next steps for prospective students including: to-do-lists, offer acceptance information, the mycambrian portal, a financial guide, important policies, etc. Please take time to review this information over the next few days.
