



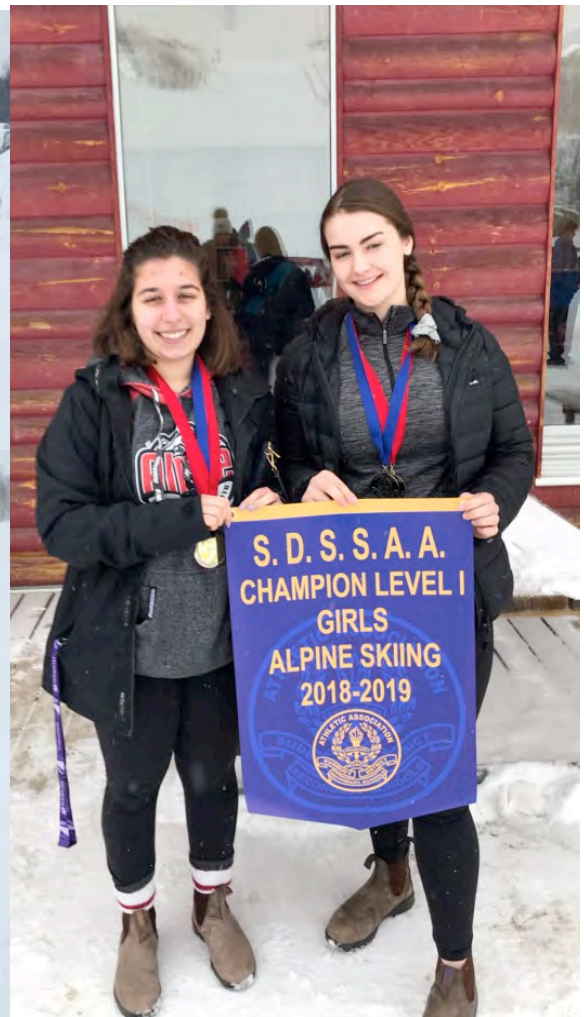

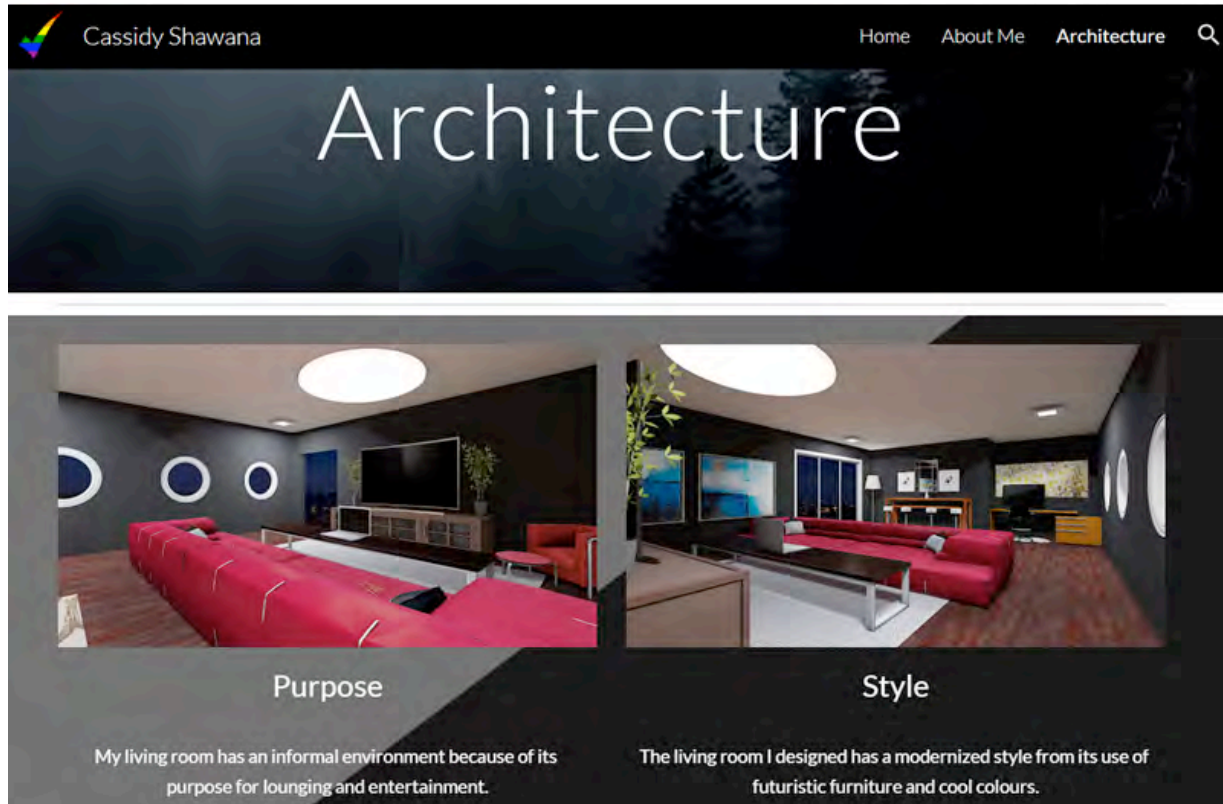
ALPINE SKIING CHAMPIONS!

GRADE 10 LITERACY TEST

A reminder to parents/guardians that grade 10 students will be writing the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) on **Wednesday, March 27th, 2019**. Attendance and preparation for this test is very important (as it is a graduation requirement).

Starting every Wednesday, beginning February 13th, Ms. Baggs will be facilitating mini workshops at lunch in Room 102. Students are welcome to attend and learn some valuable tips and strategies for the test. Lockerby Composite will also be providing intensive workshops for students in the month of March (dates to follow). There is a red binder in Student Services where students can sign-up for these intensive workshops. The workshops dates are:

- February 27th : Period 2
- February 28th : Period 3
- March 1st : Period 4
- March 19th - 21st : Periods 1 - 4
- March 22nd : Periods 1-3
- March 25th : Periods 2-4

Understanding the Literacy Test

Information for Parents and Guardians: 2019

Quick Facts

OSSLT Test

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy test will be written for approximately two and a half hours on the morning of:

Wednesday, March 27, 2019

Test Format

Students will complete 2 test booklets. Each test booklet will be completed in 75 minutes.

Participation

Successful completion of the Literacy Test is a requirement for students who entered Grade 9 in September 2017 or later and who are working toward an Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

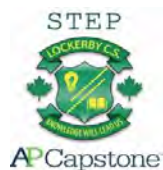
Participants in the March 27, 2019 Literacy Test may include:

- students who entered grade 9 in the 2017-2018 school year
- students who did not pass the Literacy Test in a previous test administration
- students who were absent, deferred, or exempted from a previous test administration

What will students be asked to do on the test?

The test is based on the reading and writing skills across all subjects in The Ontario Curriculum up to the end of Grade 9.

Reading Selections and Questions

Students will be asked to read a variety of selections and answer questions about each selection.



There will be two kinds of questions: multiple-choice questions and questions that require a brief explanation.

These questions will focus on:

- directly stated ideas and information
- indirectly stated ideas and information
- making connections between information and ideas in the reading selection and personal knowledge and experience

Reading selections vary in length from a single paragraph to two pages. The following types of reading selections are included on the test:

- information paragraph
- news report
- real-life narrative
- graphic selection

Writing Tasks

Students will demonstrate their writing skills by completing the following:

- short writing tasks requiring a response in six lines
- two long writing tasks
 - (1) a news report (one page in length)
 - (2) a series of paragraphs expressing an opinion (two pages in length)
- multiple-choice questions



The writing tasks focus on:

- developing a main idea with sufficient supporting details
- organizing information and ideas in a way that makes sense
- using conventions (spelling, grammar, punctuation) in a way that doesn't take away from clear communication

What happens if a student is not successful on the test?

Successful completion of the Literacy Test or the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course is a requirement for students who entered Grade 9 in September 2017 or later and are working toward an Ontario Secondary School Diploma. Students who are not successful will have the opportunity to re-take an equivalent test in future years. There is no limit to the number of times that the test may be re-taken.

What is the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course?

The Ontario Secondary Literacy course (OSSLC) is a full-credit Grade 12 course.

This course is designed to help students acquire and demonstrate the literacy skills that are evaluated by the Literacy Test. Students who complete the course successfully will meet the provincial literacy requirement for graduation.

Eligibility requirement to take the course: Students who have been eligible to write the Literacy Test at least once and who have been unsuccessful at least once are eligible to take the course.

How can parents/guardians learn more about the test and what will be required to complete the test successfully?

Teachers at Lockerby Composite School are helping students understand the requirements of the test and are providing practice opportunities so that they are well prepared to write the test.

- Grade 10 students can attend intensive OSSLT workshops in February and March (sign up in Student Services).
- Grade 10 homeroom teachers will be completing review sessions with their students.

Grade 12: Post Secondary Applications

Marks have been sent to Ontario colleges and universities. Students are asked to check their OCAS and OUAC accounts to ensure that all of their courses and marks have been transferred. Students should also be checking their individual post secondary portals (i.e. Cambrian College and/or Laurentian University). Many of the schools have been providing details regarding additional requirements, incomplete applications, etc. As such, students must ensure that all of the necessary details for their application are complete; otherwise, they risk not being accepted into their program of choice if they fail to complete this very important step. We ask that students please see a guidance counsellor if they have yet to receive any email correspondence from the post secondary institutions that they have applied to.

Grade 8: High School Applications

We are currently accepting registrations for students in Grade 8 from throughout the Sudbury District. Please remind your friends and family that applications for our STEP Program are due March 1st, 2019. Grades 9-12: Course Selection 2019-2020

Students will be completing their course selections for the 2019-2020 academic year from February 11th - February 19th, 2019. In order to assist with the planning for this process, students are asked to complete their MyBlueprint electronic course selection (www.myblueprint.ca). Parents and students are encouraged to visit our school's website for detailed course descriptions and prerequisites (www.lockerby.net).

It is especially important for our present Grade 11 students to do their course selection research because they have to ensure they are picking the proper prerequisites they need for their post-secondary program of choice. This process of selecting courses can appear intimidating for many students, but counsellors will be working closely with our students to address their questions and concerns. 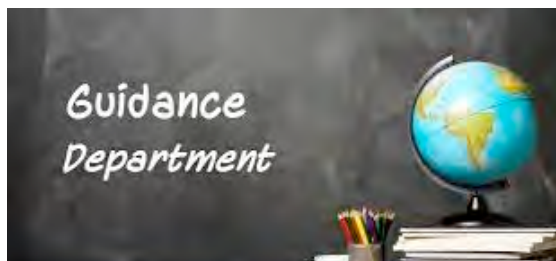
