Graduating Students: Postsecondary Money Matters

You're almost at the finish line. Congratulations! Your transition to postsecondary education is just around the corner. There are many ways to pursue financial aid and cut costs while at university and college.

Here are ten top tips to consider while pursuing postsecondary education:

1. If you are entering university with a scholarship, <u>make an attempt to</u> <u>maintain your grades</u>. Some scholarships are renewable depending on grades.

2. <u>Make an appointment with the</u> <u>Student Awards Office at your</u> <u>school to find out about scholarships</u> <u>and bursaries</u>. They can help you navigate the system.

3. Your tuition includes fees, only some of which are compulsory. For the 2019-20 year, <u>you have the</u> <u>choice to elect out of fees that fund</u> <u>campus groups, student</u> <u>newspapers, and clubs. Also, you</u> <u>can opt out of health and dental</u> <u>insurance</u> if you are already covered by your parents. It may be a few hundred dollars which you can put to good use. Keep track of the deadlines to opt out.

4. <u>Buy used textbooks</u>. In many cases it is not necessary to buy the newest edition. Connect with people who have taken the courses before by joining your university or college Facebook Group (*Class of 2023*). They can tell you what you need. Or check out the school's

online community for textbook listings, e.g., see University of Guelph's <u>The Cannon</u>.

5. Check out <u>Ecampus Ontario</u> for free or low-cost textbooks that students can view, download, or print to use in their courses.



6. Fill out an Awards Profile if your school has one. Check out the incourse scholarships that your school offers as well as Faculty, Department, and Program scholarships in your field of study. Your school may also have a list of scholarships and bursaries sponsored by external organizations. Apply for bursaries if you think you may be eligible to receive one. Note: Most deadlines remain the same from year to year. Your awareness of the scholarship "system" at your school will be helpful in your years at university or college.

7. If you don't live in your parent's home during your study period even though they live within 30 km of the school you are attending, you can <u>request a funding review</u> from OSAP. Make an appointment with Student Awards to discuss.

8. <u>Check out work study programs</u>. Most schools offer a wide range of part-time jobs to help students with demonstrated financial need. See Wilfrid Laurier University's <u>work</u> <u>study program</u> as an example. 9. If you would like <u>a review of the</u> <u>amount of funding you received from</u> <u>OSAP</u>, discuss this with Student Awards. e.g., If your parents cannot support you financially, you may be asked to write a letter. Be very transparent as to why they cannot support you. You may or may not receive funding. Your Student Awards office will let you know if you have a valid reason for a review.

10. If you are having trouble financially, <u>your school may have</u> <u>emergency funds</u> available. You will have to give a detailed budget and reasons why you need more money. Again, be transparent.

And as a final note, here are <u>10</u> Things Every High School Senior Should Know Now.

GRADUATES: Apply for OSAP **now** and have all of your funding available in September!



NOTES ON OSAP:

1. *IMPORTANT: You MUST notify the financial aid office at your school if the information on your student loan application has changed, i.e., If you make more /less in the summer than expected; this includes any awards, bursaries, or scholarships you receive from sources outside of the university. Your income must be reported accurately or your eligibility for future aid <u>may be</u> <u>impacted</u>.

2. When completing the application, be sure to note the two options for how your funding will be disbursed. If you direct OSAP funds to the university, your payment will automatically be remitted. Otherwise, it is your responsibility to submit payment before the deadline.

Canadian Labour Congress (CLC) and United Way Centraide Canada (UWCC) Post-Secondary Scholarship

Current union member, or the child/dependent of a union member affiliated to the CLC; Enrolled for September to enter first year of study at a Canadian public post-secondary institution: university program (leading to a degree) or college program (leading to a diploma or certificate) Award: \$2500 Deadline: JUNE 7

Canadian Society of Club Managers (CSCM) Val Mason Scholarship

For a student enrolled in a school, college, or university intending to pursue a career in club management; must be **nominated** by a member of the Society; must be employed, or recently employed, at a member club; essay **Award:** \$2000 award **Deadline: JUNE 10; 5 p.m.**

Black Business and Professional Association National Scholarships

Food Allergy Canada / Sabrina Shannon Memorial Award

Canadian National Institute for the Blind (CNIB) DalSense CNIB Scholarship for Students with Vision Loss

For a Canadian student who is blind or living with vision loss; enrolled or going into university or college. Note: Academic performance, service to the community, financial need, and answers to the questions considered. **Award**: \$500

*Applicant must be a former residential school attendee or a descendant of a residential school attendee (First Nation or Métis); attending postsecondary in academic programs including: Business Administration; Business Management; Accounting; Commerce and / or Finance-related programs; financial need considered **Award:** ten \$2000 awards; three \$1,000 bursaries **Deadline: JUNE 21**

CWB Welding Foundation / Secondary School Awards

For a student who shows academic excellence, a passion for the welding industry, and community involvement, entering a fulltime welding technician or welding engineering technology program with a desire to pursue a career in the industry; two reference letters; essay. **Award**: 80-100 awards of \$2,000-\$2,500 each.

Skills Ontario Scholarship

For students who are pursuing a postsecondary education as an apprentice or through a postsecondary institution in Ontario & who have received a bronze, silver, or gold medal at the 2018 Skills Ontario Competition **Awards:** \$1000 scholarships **Deadline:** *Postmarked* **no later than August 9**

Canadian Society of Club Managers (CSCM) Ontario Branch (OB) Scholarship

Enrolled in a degree or diploma program at a postsecondary institution in Ontario; min. avg. 70%; student working or has recently worked in an Ontario Branch Member Club **Awards:** one \$2000 award **Deadline: The application process should open up mid-June and it normally closes mid August.**

The Weston Family Scholarship in the Skilled Trades / Loyalist College

For children of union members graduating from high school; leadership values and labour knowledge considered; registering for courses at a public institution **Awards**: three scholarships of \$750 and four scholarships of \$1000

Johnson Inc. Scholarship Program

Credit Education Week Canada (CEWC) Essay Contest

Encounters With Canada (EWC)

120-148 teens per week go to Ottawa for one week to explore career options through experiential learning, develop leadership skills, and live a bilingual experience. Select from one of 15 careeroriented themes. 14-17 years of age. Applications are accepted year-round: First come, first served. Cost: \$750. Some provincial governments help subsidize these expenses. (Ask your local regional coordinator for more details.). Many schools help participants financially. Participants also collect funds from sponsors and organizations, e.g., Tim Hortons, Ford, General Motors, Honda, and other car dealers, and/or approach organizations, e.g., Knights of Columbus, Royal Canadian Legion, etc. * Participation in the EWC program is also officially recognized by the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award program.

Canadian Young Speakers for Agriculture Competition

Contestants prepare a 5- to 7minute speech on a <u>current issue</u> pertaining to Canada's agriculture and agri-food industries, and present it at the <u>Royal Agricultural</u> <u>Winter Fair</u> in Toronto on November 2. \$40 entry fee. <u>Prizes</u> up to \$1000. **Apply by September 30.**

Lieutenant Governor's Ontario Heritage Award for Youth Achievement

Recognizes those that have contributed to conserving Ontario's cultural and/or natural heritage. The following criteria must be met in order to be nominated: Be age 24 and under at the time of the nomination submission; has made exceptional volunteer contributions to heritage conservation; demonstrated leadership, commitment, creativity, positive impact on the community, region or province, and good conservation practices. Note: Nominees to this Award who do not receive the award can be recognized through <u>Young Heritage</u> <u>Leaders</u> if both program options selected on the nomination form.

Legislative Assembly of Ontario Youth Arts Program

Celebrates the artistic talents of young Ontarians ages 12-18. Youth are invited to display their works of art throughout the Legislative Building, from January through March. Artwork submitted consists of a variety of media including photography; sculptures; ceramics and pottery; drawings in ink, pencil and charcoal; acrylic, oil and watercolour paintings. **Online applications are accepted**

from September 10- October 15.

Employment and Social Development Canada—Enabling Accessibility Fund (EAF) Youth Innovation Component

The EAF is currently looking for youth (15-30) who want to demonstrate leadership and their commitment to their communities. Unique opportunity for young leaders to make a difference in the lives of people with disabilities by addressing accessibility barriers in public spaces or workplaces. Work with local organizations o develop solutions. Funding of up to \$10,000 is available to support capital costs of eligible projects, which may include initiatives like installing automatic door openers, constructing raised garden beds in a community garden, or acquiring specialized wheelchairs to access sandy beaches."
