SCHOOL BEAUTIFICATION AT LOCKERBY

Have you ever noticed that some schools have an ‘institutional’ feel to them? At Lockerby Composite, we hope that our hallways, common areas, and classrooms express the diversity and creativity of the people who work and learn here. Every year, the STEP Interior Design classes embark on a School Beautification Unit. This is a practical design-build project where students identify areas of our school that could use updating, and propose improvements. Groups follow the design process to brainstorm and research solutions and then make presentations to the class. From that point, we vote on the most popular project ideas, and start executing our plans.
