## **GRADE 12 STEP BIOLOGY**

This week in our STEP Biology classes, students are investigating the paired reactions of cellular respiration and photosynthesis using algae beads and carbon dioxide indicator. After investigating basic cellular respiration and photosynthesis, students chose a variable to manipulate. They then designed and carried out an investigation to see how that variable impacts both processes. Some variables included light colour, light source (LED vs. UV), and distance from light source. Results are now being measured using either colorimeters, or using colour charts (students' choice). Students will also be presenting their results in video form.



## ELECTRIFYING HIGH SCHOOL EXPERIENCE

In construction technology this week, students have been learning some electrical techniques. Statistics show that very few people know much about electricity. This is probably because we are told to be careful around electrical devices from a young age. Lockerby students have been learning how to wire plugs, switches and lights, and build extension cords from scratch. They have also become experienced with soldering techniques and splicing wires for different applications.

## HOTDOCS FESTIVAL

Lockerby Composite kicked-off the school version of Canada's International Documentary Festival—Hotdocs! Over the next week, the documentary films being offered will engage students with world issues, offer vital ideas, new perspectives and critical questions outside of mainstream media and textbooks.

## **BURNING DOWN THE HOUSE**

This week, students in grade 12 Forensic Chemistry built houses out of popsicle sticks then went outside to burn their structures to demonstrate the effects of different accelerants on a structure fire! Students also identified the point of origin based on the burn patterns and weather conditions.

## Mad scientist house

Shape: There were many openings in the structure of the house found in all the walls since they were built in a farm-like style that allowed for airflow giving the fire all the oxygen it needed. The house being made from wood allowed the fire to be fueled, along with the hot glue which acted as an accelerant. Scenario: The ignition was caused by an open flame and an ignitable liquid. The breeze was coming from the north. Starting point: Since the whole structure burned to the ground there were no ways to view a point of ignition.







## Pentagon

Shape: There were not many openings inside the house to allow any oxygen in to fuel the fire. The fire starting from an outside point was what allowed the fire to progress as quickly as in the other houses. Scenario: The ignition was caused by an open flame coming from a building closely beside it and the wind coming from the north.

Starting point: The starting point was obvious because of the structure completely burned down beside it and the burned area of the house being directly beside the other burning building.

#### Accepting University Offers - Monday, June 3rd, 2019:

Students are encouraged to complete the following steps very carefully- it is a multi-step process:

- 1. Go to https://www.ouac.on.ca/
- 2. Log in to your application using your OUAC profile username and password
- 3. Select the Choices/offers button to view your offer(s) of admission
- 4. Select the Offer or Alternate offer link to respond to your offer
- 5. Select the button to accept the offer, then select **Save and continue**
- 6. When ready to submit all changes, select **Review and submit** to complete the process.
- 7. Review and verify your application information
- 8. Carefully read the **Applicant's declaration** and select **I verify and agree**. If successfully submitted, you will receive a confirmation number on the last screen of the submission process. Print the page for reference
