

Summer co-op students can obtain one, two, or three new co-op credit(s) linked to a course they have already completed. The number of courses they can complete depends on the duration of time for which they register for the summer co-op. Students who wish to register for one or two credits will register for the session running from July 2<sup>nd</sup> to August 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2019. Students who wish to obtain a third credit must register for the session from July 2<sup>nd</sup> to August 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2019. All students registering for summer co-op must include a credit counselling summary from their current school so that proper co-op course codes can be selected. There is still time to sign-up in the program, but students should see their Guidance counsellor next week to make arrangements.

#### **ATTENTION GRADUATES:**

On Monday, June 3rd, 2019, Lockerby Composite School will be hosting its 60<sup>th</sup> convocation ceremony at Cambrian College.

Again this year, due to the large venue, no tickets will be issued. Seating will be on a first come first served basis. Doors will open at 5:30 pm.

The graduation gowns, caps and v-stoles are tentatively scheduled to arrive from Winnipeg the week of May 27<sup>th</sup>. Students will be able to pick up their gowns at the school library. The gowns must be returned **immediately** following the convocation ceremony. If students fail to return their gowns at that time, it will become their responsibility to return the gowns to the distributor incurring a possible fine of up to \$100.00.

The convocation ceremony will start promptly at 6:30 pm but we ask graduates to be at Cambrian College no later than 6:00 pm. There will be a reception at the conclusion of the ceremony.

The rehearsal for the convocation ceremony will take place the day of the ceremony, June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019 at Cambrian College. A bus will be provided for the students in the morning. Rehearsal starts at 9:30 a.m.

Students must remember that other than the rehearsal, classes will run as scheduled during graduation week. It is important to remain diligent with their academic responsibilities during this week.

On Thursday, June 13th, the graduation dance will occur at the Science North's Cavern. The tickets will go on sale at the end of May in the Students' Council Office.

The convocation ceremony and graduation dance are the only school events that are sanctioned by the school.

Lastly, students planning to attend a post-secondary institution in September must have their community service hours processed by May 31<sup>st</sup> to allow for input of records that meet the post-secondary deadlines.

As always, June is a very busy month for our students. The most important thing to remember is that we want our students to have a positive experience and stay safe during this graduation week.
